

MAINTAINING OUR CONNECTION WITH CHRIST

This gospel of Matthew is a teaching gospel. Jesus is the teacher, the rabbi. Matthew writes for the post-resurrection Church, which is us as well as Christians of the first century. We can easily imagine Jesus looking over the shoulders of his apostles who are anticipating huge success as they begin their first missionary journey. He is addressing us and urging us to keep our souls intact, to be most concerned about not betraying our mission, our inner soul. If we as Christians lose track of our connection to Christ, we will lose our way entirely. To use other images that Matthew employs in his Gospel: we will be like salt with no taste, light under a bushel. To use images from contemporary life: we will be hollow people; we will be phony, or false.



But we are equipped; we can be fierce and fearless in proclaiming and embodying the saving power of the Resurrection as Paul encourages us in the second reading. We can be sure of abundance, he writes, for the gift of God's abiding presence – grace – is not like the offense of old Adam. The grace of God is not stingy; it abounds for all. That means us.
